The Celtic Phoenix: A Sherlock Holmes Adventure by Kim Krisco, MX Publishing, 350pp, pbk £12.99. "An enigmatic jewelry case, holding human remains, arrives at the cottage of Sherlock Holmes, enticing him from his retirement refuge in the Sussex Downs. Holmes sets out on the trail of the murderer taunting him, joining forces with one of his former Baker Street Irregulars, Tessa Wiggins. The two find themselves battling forces arising from a time before England was a country – when the Celts were fighting for survival."

A Most Diabolical Plot: Six Compelling Sherlock Holmes Stories by Tim Symonds, MX Publishing, 164pp, pbk, £8.99. "In the year 1903 - the exact moment is now lost to history - Sherlock Holmes proclaimed to the world he was quitting England's capital to go into retirement on a small, wind-swept farm in the Sussex South Downs. His shocked comrade-in-arms, Dr. John H. Watson, was later to write, 'The decision took me utterly by surprise. I thought I had become an institution around Holmes, like his Stradivarius, or the old, oily black clay pipe and his index books.' Reluctantly, Watson wrote up three recent cases yet unpublished and returned to his medical practice. Holmes' retirement didn't last long. Once more, his faithful amanuensis, Watson took up his pen - and his Army service revolver. The result was three more of the most intriguing cases ever undertaken by the famous pair. All six adventures have now been brought together in this special edition."

Obituaries

Thomas D. Utecht died on 9 November. Thom discovered the Sherlockian world at a John Bennett Shaw workshop in 1984. He was a founder of the Montague Street Lodgers of Brooklyn, a member of the Three Garridebs and, along with Peter Crupe and the late Marlene Aig, was a founding member of The Occupants of the Full House. Thom received his Investiture ("Arthur Charpentier") from The Baker Street Irregulars in 1994. He also joined a rather select group of gentlemen invested in The Adventuresses of Sherlock Holmes.

Roy Upton-Holder died on 16 November. He was the Founder and Chairman of The Deerstalkers of Welshpool, and led a campaign to have all of the Sherlock Holmes stories translated into Welsh, the first of which was 'The Speckled Band' (Y Cylch Brith).
