Fraser Smyth, a friend of great personality and kindness who gave much to the Society's meetings and publications, died last month after a long illness. Despite mistaken obits, **Vassily Livanov** (Russian TV's Holmes) is still alive and working, according to Peter Blau's *Scuttlebutt*.

Sherlock Holmes: "Draco, Draconis" is published at £14.99 by Altamont Publishing, Italy (distributed by Amalgamated Book Services Ltd, Suite 1, Royal Star Arcade, High Street, Maidstone, Kent ME14 1JL). This complex and clever Holmes adventure is credited to Brett Spencer Altamont and Dorian David Altamont, which are certainly pseudonyms. (The publisher is our Italian friend Laura Altomonte.) It's a lovely book, graced with nearly 50 photos from the Granada TV series, most not published before.

Michael Atkinson's *The Secret Marriage of Sherlock Holmes, and Other Eccentric Readings* (University of Michigan Press, PO Box 1104, Ann Arbor, MI 48106-1104, USA; \$29.95 or £19.95) takes an off-centre look at 9 of the stories, reading each in an appropriate way. He approaches "A Scandal in Bohemia" as classic romance, follows the theme of the snake in "The Speckled Band" and psychoanalyses *A Study in Scarlet*. This is literary criticism that actually adds to the reader's appreciation of the text. Highly recommended. (The British distributor is Trevor Brown Associates, 114-115 Tottenham Court Road, London W1P 0BY.)

Marcus Geisser says: There are various circumstances that make the publication of 5 Neue Sherlock Holmes Story's special. Martin Hasler, the author of these short Holmes pastiches (the 5th is a mystery in itself!) is a very young but very promising Sherlockian at just 11 years old. The book, in German, is the first Holmesian publication from one of Europe's smallest countries, the Fuerstentum Liechtenstein. 5 Neue Sherlock Holmes Story's is privately printed by Klaus Woerner in an edition of 50 numbered copies of 30 pages. Price including postage is \$8.00 or £5.00 (cash only). Orders to Martin K. Hasler, Dorfstrasse 59, FL-9495 Triesen, Fuerstentum Liechtenstein, Europe.

The Littlewood Press (32 Belson Street, Malvern East, Victoria 3145, Australia; fax 03 9576 1950) publishes *You Bastard Moriarty* by Derham Groves BSI: "a consideration of the collectability of Sherlock Holmes ephemera, together with a detailed description of the life of John Bennett Shaw and his 57 years of collecting". This richly illustrated limited edition of 100 numbered & signed copies is hand printed and sectionally sewn, with endpapers from the Holmes, Watson and Moriarty pages of the telephone directories. The standard version (90 copies) costs \$75.00, and the 10 deluxe copies, bound in kangaroo leather, are

\$450.00. There's also a souvenir of the book's launch: an illustrated 8-page octavo booklet: *The Coming Out of Holmes & Watson*. Copies 1 - 10, with more than 40 relevant autographs, are priced at \$75.00; copies 11 - 50 are \$50.00 each. (*These prices are in Australian dollars.*)

Kelvin I. Jones (Oakmagic Publications, 2 South Place Folly, Penzance, Cornwall TR18 4JB) has reissued his 1980 monograph *Sherlock Holmes & the South Eastern* at £2.50 + 50p postage (cheques payable to K.I. Jones). He plans *The Psychology of The Hound* (£3.50) for the spring, and a guide to the Dartmoor locations of *The Hound of the Baskervilles* for the summer.

The December catalogue from Ian Henry Publications Ltd (20 Park Drive, Romford RM1 4LH) will include the film scripts of The Adventure of Sherlock Holmes' Smarter Brother, The Adventures of Sherlock Holmes, The Hound of the Baskervilles (1939), The Seven-per-cent Solution and Young Sherlock Holmes, each at £25.00. Jeremy Paul's The Secret of Sherlock Holmes is back in print from Ian Henry at £5.95.

There are full and exciting new catalogues available from **Rupert Books** (58/59 Stonefield, Bar Hill, Cambridge CB3 8TE; phone 01954 781861); **Forbes Gibb** (29 Falkland Street, Hyndland, Glasgow G12 9QZ; phone 0141 339 3752); and **Classic Specialties** (PO Box 19058, Cincinnati, OH 45219). That last, *The Sherlockian Times*, 1996-97, lists *The Life and Times of Mr Sherlock Holmes, John H. Watson, MD, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, and Other Notable Personages* by Leslie S. Klinger (\$10.00), *I Hear of Sherlock Everywhere* by Joe Kruth (\$5.00), *Fixed Point* — *The Audio* by David Stuart Davies (\$7.95), and more new to me.

Tangled Web Audio (1063 King Street West, Suite 133, Hamilton, Ontario L8S 1L8, Canada) has released two more sets of unabridged readings by Edward Hardwicke. *Sherlock Holmes: Tales of Betrayal* has "A Scandal in Bohemia", "Silver Blaze" & "The Copper Beeches"; *Sherlock Holmes: Tales of Avarice* has "The Red-Headed League", "The Blue Carbuncle" & "The Priory School". Recording and production are impeccable; Hardwicke proves again that there's no better interpreter of Conan Doyle. Marvellous stuff! Each double cassette costs US\$16.95 or Can.\$19.95. Tangled Web takes direct orders, and Rupert Books, Classic Specialties and selected bookstores carry these tapes.

Peter Blau says: The first 8 audiocassettes in the series *More New Adventures of Sherlock Holmes* from the fine 1946-47 radio series that starred Tom Conway & Nigel Bruce are still available (\$9.95 each) from Brilliance Audio, Box 481, Grand Haven, MI 49417; more cassettes are due in the shops in November.

Phil Attwell notes that the Audio Book Collection (Freepost [BA 1686/1], Bath BA2 3SZ) offers a complete reading by Terrence Hardiman of Colin Dexter's book *Morse's Greatest Mystery*, which includes his good revisionist Holmes story "A Case of Mis-identity". The special price is £9.95.
