I and many other members of the Society were friends of the late Richard Lancelyn Green, so I provide the following information with some trepidation: Emmy nominee Alan Tudyk (Rogue One: A Star Wars Story) will lead the cast of the world premiere of Mysterious Circumstances at Los Angeles' Geffen Playhouse this summer. Tudyk stars as Richard Lancelyn Green and Sherlock Holmes. "Based on a true story, Michael Mitnick's new play is an ode to Sherlock Holmes, and a meditation on the line between love and obsession. Inspired by *The New Yorker* article "Mysterious Circumstances: The Strange Death of a Sherlock Holmes Fanatic" by David Grann, the play tells the story of Richard Lancelyn Green, the world's foremost scholar on Sherlock Holmes and Sir Arthur Conan Doyle. When he is found dead in his London apartment, with multiple suspects and competing motives at play, Green's death raises questions that may be answered only by Holmes himself." Obituaries

The popular British comedian **Freddie Starr** died on 9th May, age 76. He had a long and versatile career on stage and television and was renowned for his vast range of impressions, including Elvis Presley, Mick Jagger and Adolf Hitler. Unfortunately, he is possibly best known for the headline concocted in 1986 by *The Sun* newspaper: "Freddie Starr Ate My Hamster". The comedian was accused of putting the live pet of a friend between two pieces of bread and devouring it. The story was a complete fabrication, devised by the disgraced late PR man Max Clifford. It would be nicer to recall that Starr once played Sherlock Holmes. According to **Peter Blau**: "A British 30-minute variety show broadcast by Anglia (ITV) on July 29, 1994; the program included a 5-minute 'Sherlock Holmes' skit. Cast: Freddie Starr (Holmes), Brian Murphy (Moriarty). References (held): Evening Herald, July 29, 1994; Canadian Holmes, winter 1994, p. 51)."
